Some current key issues

- Mapping and forecasting the complete creative pipeline
- Engaging with wider cultural policy
- REF, PAR and impact
- Transition to TEF
- Evidence-based policy and planning (metrics)
- Opening the sector to competition

The creative pipeline

- Secondary creative education: already in crisis; NSEAD Survey, EBacc, Academisation
- HE: TEF, Metrics, HE apprenticeships; Green Paper opens HEIs to competition from global providers and is rapidly becoming the HE Bill (White Paper estimated 18 May)
 - New QA system, to be compatible with TEF; transitional arrangements –
 Subject Benchmark Consultation and proposed training for external examiners
 - Challenge-Driven University
 - Diversity HE 2020 targets to double disadvantaged access unlikely to be met in established sector, concerns that 'alternative' providers will rapidly develop poor quality provision for marginal students
- Industry skills requirement horizon: (CHEAD working with NESTA, CIF and CCSkills) to explore methodologies for revised evidence base.
 Creative Industries economic estimates consultation : proposes 10% uplift to compensate for invisibility of micro-businesses in the cultural sector and proposes parity between productivity of creative occupations within and outside creative industries

Cultural Policy

- AHRC Understanding the Value of Arts & Culture : robust methodologies for demonstrating the value of the arts and culture
- DCMS White paper: extols creative education but no mention of EBacc or local authority cuts
 - Diversity: four-year Cultural Citizens Programme led by ACE and HLF that would reach 70 areas with low cultural participation
 - Placemaking and regional agendas: reviews of Arts Council England, the museums sector, and the Heritage Lottery Fund

Research

- Lord Stern's review of the REF: CHEAD responded to the call for evidence and will monitor closely
- The Metric Tide: metrics may supplement peer review but are no substitute – this view is borne out by WONKHE's review of the consultation responses

General trends:

- Evidence-based approaches, decision-making informed by machine data
- Centralisation, bypassing democratic pluralism
- Transfer of assets from public bodies to private trusts

Barriers to engagement?

- Time pressures
- Lack of information
- Limited reach beyond personal affinity networks
- Governmental 'speed-up' and flood of legislation makes it difficult to respond

We need?

- Low-time-impact communications and collaboration structures
- Reach and information channels
- Quick feedback from the network
- Co-ordinated focus
- Sustained follow-up
